## Annual review 2015

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**Ecumenical Campaign:  
What we eat changes the climate**  
The ecumenical campaign highlighted in a comprehensible way, by using the example of meat consumption, the impact which our consumption habits have on the climate. During the campaign, 21,000 signatures were collected for the climate petition, which called for stronger commitment to climate protection by the Swiss authorities.

### Philippines: Forced displacement by commercial operations becomes an issue

In 2013, Fastenopfer produced a study about the impact of the Tampakan mining project on human rights. Glencore has now sold its share in the mine. Subsequently, the area became more heavily militarised and thus more insecure for the indigenous communities. Partners from Mindanao took their concerns to the Human Rights Council in Geneva. Thanks to our good contacts, the UN Special Rapporteur on 'internally displaced persons' visited Tampakan in July.

**Development policy campaign:  
Companies, take responsibility!**  
With the Responsible Business Initiative, 77 organisations are demanding mandatory regulations to be imposed on companies for the protection of people and the environment. Fastenopfer is supporting the initiative: At a media conference in August, we showed the impact that two mining projects in South Africa have on the living conditions of the population and how the Geneva-based company Vitol is dealing with it. The campaign was accompanied by an online test 'CEO-for-a-day'.

### Bogotá: South-South: Learning from each other

Fastenopfer encourages the exchange of experiences between programmes: Two persons from the Guatemala Programme shared the methods of 'personal growth' with 35 participants in a workshop in Bogotá. This psychosocial work is used as a tool to come to terms with traumatic experiences. And in October, a representative from Burkina Faso visited Senegal to find out more about savings groups. With success: three partner organisations are keen on this approach.

### Lucerne More money for project work

Fastenopfer increased its total income in 2015 by 1.9 million Swiss francs over the previous year to nearly 25 million Swiss francs. This result is due to loyal private donors, more legacies, and a higher SDC contribution. Once again, the aid agency spent more money on the South projects, as well as on research work and development-policy activities (+579,678 Swiss francs). The aid agency's total expenditure for projects amounted to 21.4 million Swiss francs.

### Compliance: Corruption must not be a taboo subject



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



21,000 women and men signed the climate petition during the 2015 ecumenical campaign. A strong signal in favour of more climate protection.


